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The Lagos Flash Fiction Series by Tolulope Popoola is a collection of short, vibrant stories set in Lagos, Nigeria, capturing the city's dynamic culture through various perspectives. Each story, typically under 1,000 words, offers a snapshot of life in Lagos, blending humour, drama, and social commentary. The series includes titles like *Memoirs of a Lagos Wedding Planner*, *Memoirs of a Lagos Taxi Driver*, *Memoirs of a Lagos Junior Banker*, *Memoirs of a Serial Best Man*, *Memoirs of a Lagos Baker*, and *More Adventures of a Lagos Wedding Planner*, released on May 1, 2025.

Key Themes and Style

- **Urban life:** The stories reflect Lagos's bustling energy, from its chaotic traffic to its vibrant social scene, highlighting the challenges and aspirations of its residents.
- **Diverse perspectives:** Characters like Bisi (wedding planner), Ladi (taxi driver), Onome (junior banker), CJ (serial best man), and Dayo (baker) offer varied lenses on Lagos life, showcasing professional and personal struggles.
- **Humour and irony:** Popoola uses witty dialogue and surprising twists, as seen in *Memoirs of a Lagos Wedding Planner*, where a client reveals a marriage has ended and requests a new wedding.
- **Social commentary:** The series subtly addresses issues like corruption, relationships, and societal expectations, often with a light yet poignant touch.

Notable Works

- **Memoirs of a Lagos Wedding Planner:** A collection of ten flash fiction stories following Bisi, a resourceful wedding planner navigating quirky clients and unexpected drama, earning Popoola the title "Africa's Flash Fiction Queen."
- **Memoirs of a Lagos Taxi Driver:** Explores the life of Ladi, a driver dealing with the city's chaos and diverse passengers.
- **Memoirs of a Lagos Junior Banker:** Follows Onome, a young banker facing corporate pressures and personal dilemmas.

Cultural Significance

The series captures Lagos's essence: its hustle, diversity, and resilience, through concise narratives that resonate with Nigerian readers and beyond. Popoola's work aligns with the broader flash fiction movement, which emphasizes brevity and impact, akin to works by authors like Nnedi Okorafor (*Lagoon*) or Flora Nwapa (*This Is Lagos and Other Stories*). Her stories, rooted in Nigerian experiences, contribute to the global rise of African literature, particularly in short-form storytelling.

The series is available in both ebook and paperback formats on platforms like Amazon, Selar, Apple, Kobo, and other retail platforms. Kindle editions cater to a global audience, and her work is accessible for readers seeking quick, engaging reads. The audiobook edition is planned for release later in 2026.

For those interested in similar works, *Lagos Noir* (edited by Chris Abani) offers darker, crime-focused short

stories, while Remi Roy's *From the Sidelines* explores historical flash fiction with a Nigerian perspective.
